Applications Open for MBA in Advancing Reconciliation

VICTORIA, B.C. – The BC Association of Aboriginal Friendship Centres (BCAAFC) and the University of Victoria's Peter B. Gustavson School of Business are now accepting applications for the second intake of the MBA in Advancing Reconciliation — the first program of its kind in Canada.

"We are excited to welcome the next cohort of leaders into this transformative program," said Annette Morgan, President of BCAAFC and a member of the first graduating class. "This MBA creates space for Indigenous voices, builds critical leadership capacity, and fosters the skills needed to advance reconciliation in real and lasting ways. The social services sector needs leaders ready to drive meaningful change, and we look forward to seeing how this next group will carry that work forward."

Launched in 2022 with \$8.4 million in provincial funding, the MBA in Advancing Reconciliation is designed to challenge colonial systems and support Indigenous-led change across the social services sector. Through dialogue, knowledge sharing, and community-based learning, the program equips participants to lead organizational transformation grounded in Indigenous worldviews and priorities.

Following the success of the inaugural cohort, the program will expand to include a total of three cohorts, helping to build long-term leadership capacity in communities across the province and beyond.

"With two additional cohorts launching in 2026, we look forward to seeing even more leaders from our communities' step into this opportunity," said Julie Robertson, Interim Executive Director of BCAAFC and a member of the graduating class. "We hope to secure further funding for expanded training, more seats and even PhD-level education in the future. Every new graduate strengthens the movement. Every new voice adds power to our collective advocacy."

Applications for the second intake close August 31, 2025.
